But the natural beauty of Newfoundland and Labrador is at risk – we have to work together to protect it.

What can you do?

- · Follow the guidelines in this brochure.
- Request that the government enforce current protected areas regulations so irresponsible ATV use is reduced.

Be a good example!

Currently there are over 40,000 ATVs operating in this province, and most of them are being used on the island portion.

If even 1% of these ATVs are being used carelessly, that means over 400 people are driving across wetlands and beaches, destroying habitats, and disturbing wildlife, and giving ATV riders a bad name.

The reality is that more than 1% of riders drive their ATVs irresponsibly, and the damage they cause is often impossible to repair.



Stay on existing trails!



A natural legacy

If we want our children to have the privilege to 'get away from it all' we need to take action.

Protect Wetlands:

Irresponsible ATV use on wetlands leaves deep ruts that alter water flow, interrupt the ecosystem and threaten plant and animal life.

Protect Beaches:

Indiscriminate ATV use on beaches ruins nesting grounds and destroys dunes, threatening rare species and causing permanent damage.

Be A Skilled Driver:

Learn the best way to travel on steep grades, slick terrain, and over rocky areas, so you can keep yourself safe and your impact on the evironment to a minimum.

Get Involved:

Protect the land you ride on: report irresponsible use of ATVs, support stronger enforcement in protected areas, and train new riders to ride responsibly.



How to be a responsible ATV rider

Stay on Existing Trails

Existing trails are planned for low impact riding. Creating new trails destroys plant life, changes water drainage patterns, and disturbs wildlife.

Plan Abead

Planning your trip carefully keeps you safe and protects the environment. Plan to avoid ecologically-sensitive areas, dense plant-life, and wildlife areas.

Keep Your Vehicle Tuned

A well-tuned vehicle makes less noise and operates smoothly, keeping pollution to a minimum.

Ride with Care

Reduce your impact by picking the driest trails, minimizing wheel spin, staying off steep grades, and avoiding waterways whenever possible.

Respect Others

Hikers and hunters don't prevent your enjoyment of the trail, try not to prevent theirs. Use your well-tuned vehicle at low foot-traffic times.
