FROM THE AGE OF THE DINOSAURS: THE LEATHERBACK SEA TURTLE

This month, CPAWS-NL's featured animal is the leatherback sea turtle. The Leatherback Sea Turtle has been around since the age of the dinosaurs and evolved approximately 100 million years ago. This turtle migrates through Newfoundland and Labrador's waters usually in the summer months and was originally named for its leathery appearing shell. Although leatherback sea turtles have been around for millions of years, they are currently endangered, largely due to human activity. Entanglement in fishing gear is the biggest threat to these animals while in Atlantic Canada. Other threats include light pollution, vessel collisions, climate change and poaching activity.
