A HOME FOR NATURE

On May 28, 2020, the Wilderness and Ecological Reserves Advisory Council (WERAC) was finally granted the opportunity to publicly release the long-awaited proposed Protected Areas Plan for the Island of Newfoundland, entitled <u>A Home for Nature</u>. This plan is a blueprint for developing a system of protected areas for the Island, and the proposed boundaries are not final.

The government took over two decades to release the plan - and now, with only one day left we need your help to protect the island's natural bounty and prohibit the opportunity for large industrial operations to degrade our lands and coastal waters. Tell the government tyou support protected areas in NL.

Rest assured, you will get additional time to voice your views regarding each individual site once the plan is passed. Each site will go through an in-depth consultation period with the public. But for now we need to ensure we have a Protected Areas Plan for the province

We would like to thank all of our wonderful volunteers for another successful puffin fledging season! This year we had the help of over 1000 registered patrollers to catch **386 pufflings**, which we banded and then released with the help of O'Brien's Whale and Bird Tours and Gatherall's Puffin Whale Watch.

Newfoundland and Labrador is home to the world's largest humpback whale population who arrive in our ocean between May and September to feed.

This summer has been an incredible season for these gentle giants, as they coincide when capelin roll. Like Newfoundland and Labradorians, they also literally jump with joy when they have a feed of yummy capelin!


